

What is the SKP Survey?

The Safer Kingston Partnership (SKP) Survey aimed to gather the views of those that live, work, study and travel in Kingston Upon Thames. The focus of the survey was to build on previous engagement work and an opportunity for respondents to tell us:

- How safe they feel in Kingston during the day time and night time.
- How we can improve our communication on community safety topics
- What we can do to make people aware of local support services,
- How we empower and support citizens and communities who want to work collaboratively with us to identify and implement solutions to local problems.

The survey was conducted from Monday 4th March 2024 - Monday 22nd April 2024.

A total of 197 responses were received.

The survey was accessible online through the Kingston 'Let's Talk' Portal and was also carried out with community groups through in-person engagement.







'You Said, We Did....'


Prior to starting the survey, respondents were shown examples of actions taken based on previous feedback through a 'You Said We Did' presentation. This highlighted:

- Work undertaken in Cloisters Mall with street art to make the space more inviting.
- Information on a Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) extension at Eagle Brewery Wharf
- Expansion on victim support services
- · Increased youth worker visibility
- Canbury Gardens Parks police initiative
- Bystander training sessions
- Anti Hate Crime Protest Art Workshop
- Youth Safety Forum
- Increased community engagement
- And more...



































Feelings of safety During the day time (6am - 6pm)

Locations of feelings of unsafety during the day time included Kingston Town Centre (Eden Street, Adams Walk, Clarence Street, Castle Street, Fife Road). Other locations included Cambridge Road, Tolworth Broadway/Roundabout, Canbury Gardens and the Alpha Road Estate.


Locations listed under Kingston Town Centre appeared more frequently than other areas in the borough.

Some people reported feeling unsafe in certain locations due to unlit areas, groups of young people gathering, and concerns about theft and drug use.















Feelings of safety During the night time (6pm - 6am)


Locations of feelings of unsafety during the night time included Kingston Town Centre (PRYZM Night Club), Eden Street, Kingston Railway Station, Cloisters Mall, Castle Street, Fife Road), Canbury Gardens, Alexandra Rec, Elm Road and Cambridge Road.

Many respondents indicated that Kingston Town Centre felt least safe at night due to issues such as drunken behaviour, antisocial activities, and and drug-related crimes.

















Have you experienced a crime in the last 12 months? (experiencing a crime means either being a victim or perpetrator of a crime)











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
Respondents were asked if they had previously experienced any crime in Kingston, and further information about the crimes they encountered includes:

Many of these incidents pertained to offences involving vehicles, such as theft from a motor vehicle and dangerous driving. Others include theft from individuals, and witnessing drug-related crimes, including drug supply / dealing.









Other answer categories: improved communications about the work we are doing, information about support for those affected by crime, support offenders, no opinion, other

Respondents were also asked to suggest ways that the Safer Kingston Partnership can tackle these issues, which included:

- Activities and support for middle-aged and elderly people
- Increased police presence
- Victim support services
- Promoting community cohesion
- Support for offenders
- More youth centers / provisions for young people
- Encouraging neighborhood watch groups
- Improved lighting and CCTV


























What we have done since the survey (Not exhaustive)

- June 2024 Womens Matter' Talk at the Migrant Advocacy Service
- June 2024 Cuckooing workshop Met police
- June 2024 London Fire Brigade Open day Awareness on Antisocial Behaviour, Violence Against Women & Girls & Domestic Abuse (VAWG)
- July & August 2024 Patrols from the Wandsworth Parks Police in Canbury Gardens, Elm Rd and Latchmere Recreation Grounds on Friday and Saturday evening during the summer holidays

- October 2024 Hate Crime stall at Kingston Station with the Metropolitan Police & Workshop at the Migrant Advocacy Service
- October 2024 Young Parent Connect Launch event at the Cambridge Road Estate
- November 2024 Antisocial Behaviour (ASB) Awareness stall in Kingston Town Centre as part of ASB Awareness Week
- November 2024 create new ASB flyers to promote reporting and the ASB case review



ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR (ASB) CASE REVIEW



Are you persistently experiencing ASB? Have you reported ASB at least 3 times in the last 6 months?

If so, an ASB Case Review may be activated. This includes reports made to the council, the police, a housing provider, or any other responsible body. A multi-agency approach will be taken by the Safer Kingston Partnership to conduct the review.

(Please note, this does not replace general reporting methods or the formal complaints procedure.)

To request a review, you will need to provide:

- · Your details
- · Information about the previous ASB
- Organisation/s previously reported to (including any reference numbers)
